




SHARE OF TOTAL FEDERAL SPENDING

THE HOW DID WE GET HERE - SEQUESTRATION


Real World Impacts:

- Nearly 7.4 million students affected
- 58,000 kids lost after school supports
- 65,000 fewer Head Start slots
- 100,000 families could face homelessness
- 5 days of furloughs for DoD Schools
- Thousands of teachers, support staff, and education jobs lost




Long-Term Disinvestment in Kids



TURNING IT AROUND


A majority say the last decade has not been beneficial to children.







Percent of Uninsured Children


































Figure 1: Absolute Poverty in the U.S. & U.K. 1989–2009
