The Fostering Connections to Success and Increasing Adoptions Act (P.L. 110-351)

Sweeping federal reforms for children and families

Enacted October 7, 2008

Bipartisan legislation with broad support among stakeholders

Former foster youth played key advocacy role





About Fostering Connections

The law promotes permanency and improved outcomes for children in foster care through policy changes in six key areas:

- Support for kinship care and family connections,
- Support for older youth,
- Coordinated health services,
- Improved educational stability and opportunities,
- Incentives and assistance for adoption, and
- Direct access to federal resources for Indian Tribes.



How Fostering Connections Addressed Needs of Older Youth

- A state option to extend Title IV-E reimbursable foster care, adoption, or guardianship assistance payments to children after the age of 18;
- A requirement that personal transition plans for youth aging out are developed within 90 days prior to youth exiting foster care;
- Extending eligibility for Independent Living
 Program services & ETV to children adopted or placed in kinship guardianship at age 16 or older;
- Extending Medicaid eligibility



Snapshot of Implementation Efforts to Extend Care Beyond Age 18

At least 12 states have received federal approval to extend assistance beyond age 18; additional states have enacted
